Curator's Corner New Year, New Exhibits! (and some new spaces for some old friends)

When we moved to 401 Main Street, we realized that this lovely building was the former home of the Klimpke family. It was built in 1897 for Mary Julia Heminway (daughter of Buell Heminway and Julia (Havens) Heminway) when she married Taft tutor, Paul Klimpke. The family lived here for over 40 years.

This fall, we were so excited to hear from a Klimpke descendant, Julia Miner, and began conversations about the home and family. The result is that furniture owned by Paul & Julia Klimpke will be finding its way back into our Museum, thanks to the generosity of the Miner family and their relatives. This year we are opening a new exhibit "Mary Julia's Parlor" to honor the Klimpke/Heminway families and tell their story using those donated pieces, including a settee and some family photos through the years. Currently this space is decorated for the holidays and will remain that way through January. We'd like to thank our newest Board member, Roger J. Spinelli, of RJS Event Designs for generously donating the decorations, allowing our Museum to be full of holiday cheer!



We also recently completed two projects to create new storage spaces for our cherished collection in our climate controlled, archive safe, attic. The first was a storage space for large framed works, such as photographs and paintings. The second project created a large space to house our extensive textile collection.

With these spaces completed, in 2022 we will be moving our old friends into their new homes! None of these projects would be possible without the help of

Being a Docent: This position is great for a people person! You will be giving tours and teaching visitors about Watertown's great history.

Handyman Projects: Great for someone who likes working with their hands. Our resident handyman, and current Board President, Ivan is always looking for an assistant or two to help build/put together whatever the museum needs!

Researching: Not great with people but you know where all of the good history is found? Then our research team is for you! These volunteers help to answers questions via mail or email to those asking for help with research projects of their own, utilizing our vast collections and archives. You will also help to gain knowledge about all the pieces coming into our collection and help to write object labels to be used in exhibits.

Collections Photography/Archive Scanning: Professional and amateur photographers alike will enjoy this role. To help keep track of our massive collection, we need pictures of all the objects. This also will involve scanning

documents, photos, and other archival materials so that the museum can create visual records of its pieces.

Data Entry: Great for a detail-oriented person! The Watertown History Museum just switched over to a cloud-based collections software, and we need volunteers to help us keep that information clean and accurate. You will be inputting data related to the objects in our collection, as well as making sure that data is easily accessible for future use.

These are not all of what we offer. As the museum's needs change and as we adapt to the changes from Covid-19, we will add or subtract different roles and responsibilities.
